On Thursday, February 16, California Assemblymember, Chris Holden, introduced AB 1228, The Fast-Food Franchisor Responsibility Act, which will establish joint liability between franchise brands and California franchisees, applying to quick-service restaurant brands with 100+ locations nationwide. This is a direct response to IFA's successful referendum campaign pausing implementation of the FAST Act, as well as our past advocacy efforts that resulted in the removal of joint liability in the final bill last year. IFA released this statement and will be mobilizing our coalition resources quickly.

IFA Releases Second Annual Survey on Labor Trends

Last week, IFA released its 2023 study on labor trends in franchising, showing that the availability of qualified labor remains the number one challenge facing franchised businesses. In this second inaugural study, conducted by FRANdata, the survey shows slight improvement in labor market conditions, but four out of five franchised brands continue to experience constrained growth due to labor challenges. "Through the challenges, the franchise system has shown its proven advantages to help franchisees address the shortage and continue their growth," said Michael Layman, senior vice president of government relations and public affairs for the International Franchise Association.

DOL Wage and Hour Nomination Stalls in Committee

On Wednesday, February 15, President Biden's nominee for the Department of Labor's (DOL) Wage and Hour Division, Jessica Looman, failed to gain a favorable vote from the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) Committee voting 11-10 in opposition to Looman's nomination. Senator Bill Cassidy, M.D. (R-LA), ranking member of the HELP Committee, said in a **press release**, "During Ms. Looman's tenure as principal deputy administrator, the Wage and Hour Division has issued multiple proposed rules that would effectively destroy the independent contracting and franchising industries, revealing an antiquated approach to a twenty-first century workforce." Looman seeks to fill the role after President Biden's previous nominee David Weil was defeated on the Senate floor as a result of IFA advocacy.


IFA Promotes Franchising on FTC Noncompete Forum

On Thursday, February 16, **Haider Murtaza, Director of Government Relations at IFA**, participated in the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) public forum to discuss the impact of the FTC's <u>proposed non-compete rule</u> (NPRM) to ban non-compete agreements. The call opened up with brief remarks from the Chair Lina Khan, followed by an overview of the proposed rule by Elizabeth Wilkins, Director of the office of Policy and Planning. Murtaza provided that, "IFA believes that non-competition clauses in the FR-FE relationship protect the FR as well as the FEs that invest in the brand by building and operating a unit in the system." Earlier that week, Chairman Jim Jordan (R-OH) and Ranking member Jerry Nadler (D-NY) of the House Judiciary Committee <u>sent a letter</u> to Federal Trade Commission (FTC)

Chair Lina Khan and her fellow commissioners stating that the <u>proposed non-compete rule</u> exceeds the agency's authority and would negatively impact the U.S. economy.
MPC Provides Comments on FTC Mastercard Settlement
On Monday, February 13, the Merchants Payments Coalition (MPC) provided comments on the recently announced <u>proposed settlement</u> between the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and Mastercard, Inc. relating to Mastercard's tokenization policies and violations of Federal Reserve Regulation II.
